Arrangements are being made to stream the service to a large screen under the TEDS tent where most of the congregation will be accommodated. In this way our vulnerable infant candidates for baptism, who are not able to mask, will be relatively safe inside the church building. All adult candidates and at least one parent of infant candidates are required to participate in the Parish Spiritual Conference (see above) and the Baptismal Rehearsal (Saturday, October 30 from 10 AM to 11 AM) as part of preparation for the sacrament.

Pentecost Octave & Trinity Sunday 2022

There are many and varied services and events planned for Trinity's 150th Anniversary year in 2022. During the season of Epiphany (January and February 2022) I will endeavor to bless every home in the parish and deliver a special 150th anniversary calendar to each parishioner. At the heart of our celebrations will be the Pentecost Octave which culminates in Trinity Sunday (Sunday, June 5 through Sunday, June 12).

A liturgical octave is an eight-day period specifically set aside for the continuing celebration of a feast: in our case the Feast of Pentecost. By the high middle ages this practice had become a regular and significant feature of corporate worship in the western church. In 2022 we will observe the Pentecost Octave with a week, and a day, of evensong services beginning on Pentecost Sunday and concluding on Trinity Sunday.

Former priests, seminarians, or significant people in the life and history of Trinity Church will be invited to preach a short homily each evening. Anointing with the oil of chrism, for the renewal of God's people, will be offered at these services as an outward and visible sign of the Holy Spirit's activity in our lives. On Trinity Sunday, the last day of the octave and our Feast of Title, we will welcome Bishop Stokes to preside at the 10 AM Holy Eucharist. If ever there is a day that should not be missed, it is this one! Please carve out that time in your calendars and watch this space...

Lectionary & Liturgy

Proper 20 - Year B When the Church gathers to worship, it acts out its allegiance to God and its service to the world. In the action of the liturgy we express our service to each other. That liturgical action is the pattern for our daily living as God's friends and as fellow servants with Christ to all people. The liturgy, then, is extended beyond the doors of the church building into all of life.

In the first reading, the prophet speaks of the opposition he faces from those who reject his message. They plot his death and he describes their plots in ways that reminded the first Christians of the rejection of Jesus that led to his death.

Again we read from the Epistle of James. After describing the characteristics of those who are at peace with God, the author states that strife, jealousy, and estrangement are the products of allying ourselves with the world rather than with God.

In today's Gospel reading Jesus again predicts his death and resurrection. The disciples fail to understand and dispute among themselves which of them is the most important. Jesus tells them that the highest status in his kingdom is reserved for those who serve. This is a call to pattern our lives on his life in self-giving love.

On the other hand, it may be sung as a song of dedication. The worshiper commits to live in the light of Christ." Currently Organist and Music Director at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Austin, TX, this is her best-known hymn, written in the summer of 1966 when she was a part of the charismatic group at the Church of the Redeemer, Episcopal in Houston, the town after which she named the tune.
- † Collect of the Day Reflecting the tumultuous times of the barbarian invasions; Colossians 3:2 is the biblical reference, and it is included in the BCP for the first time. -[Notes on the American Prayer Book by Marion Hatchett]
- Proclaiming Hymn Words: James Montgomery (1771-1854). "The secrets of his power were manifold. His poetic genius was of a high order; his ear for rhythm was exceedingly accurate and refined. His knowledge of Holy Scripture was most extensive; his religious views were broad and charitable. His devotional spirit was of the holiest type; with the faith of a strong man he united the beauty and simplicity of a child. Richly poetic without exuberance, dogmatic without uncharitableness, tender without sentimentality, elaborate without diffusiveness, richly musical without apparent effort, he has bequeathed to the Church of Christ wealth which could only have come from a true genius and a sanctified! heart. –[John Julian, Dictionary of Hymnology (1907)] Music: English folk melody thought by some scholars to date back to the Middle Ages; adapt. and harm. Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) who introduced it as a hymn tune in *The English Hymnal*, 1906. © By permission of Oxford University Press.
- † Gospel The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn't just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was more like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal who was hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, "a famished land." It was, he said, like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there before.
- * Nicene Creed This version is designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (filioque) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without approval of a General Council.

- Sending Hymn Words: Francis Bland Tucker (1895-1984), first published in *The Hymnal 1940* when he was rector of St. John's, Georgetown, Washington, D.C. It is based on Philippians 2:5–11. "There is no better 20th-century writing in either of our countries than is to be found in Tucker." –[British hymnologist Erik Routley] Tucker offered some insight: "I never thought of writing a hymn until in 1937 I was put on the Commission to propose a new hymnal. This Commission produced *The Hymnal 1940*. Each of us assigned a different hymnal to study, and to present a hymn from it to be considered I found passages quoted from early Christian writings that had hymnic qualities, though written in prose. Among these were the Eucharistic prayers in the Didache (*The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles*, probably written c. 110) and the *Epistle to Diognetus* (c. 190). I paraphrased these." Raymond Glover, writing in 1994, remarked, "The test of time and the verdict of critics of hymnology mark this text as one of the finest works of F. Bland Tucker." Music: Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). "The tune name commemorates the site of a famous Benedictine abbey in Switzerland. Stanford might have visited it in 1873 when he returned to Cambridge from Bonn by way of Switzerland and Paris." –[Carl Daw]

The 13th Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey

- On September 2, Bishop Stokes called for the election of the 13th Bishop of New Jersey, announcing his intent to retire in June 2023. The Standing Committee has general oversight responsibility for the election process and is working on retaining a consultant to advise them and the wider diocesan community.
- Ms. Valaida Guerrero, member of St. Andrew's, New Providence and a Trustee of the Diocese, will serve as the Chair of the Episcopal Search and Nomination Committee for the election, in accordance with Diocesan Canon 9, Section 3(c).
- On September 26, each congregation will meet to nominate six people to attend a special Convocation Meeting. Congregations will report the names of their representatives to the dean of their convocation. On October 24, Convocations will hold a special meeting to elect from the parish representatives 1 clergy and 1 lay person for the Bishop Search and Nomination Committee.
- June 24, 2023—Consecration of the 13th Bishop of New Jersey

Redacted from Bishop Stokes letter to the Diocese

For everything there is a season ... Ecclesiastes 3:1

I am writing to let you know that, following prayer and consultation with family, trusted friends and trusted advisors, I have determined that the time has come for me to call for the election of the 13th Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey and to notify you of my intention to resign and retire as Bishop in June 2023. At that time, God-willing, I will be 66 years old and will have served the diocese for almost ten years. My intention is not to call for a bishop co-adjutor, but to call for the election of the next diocesan bishop. Prayer, discernment and a recognition of the changing needs and demands of The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of New Jersey indicate it is time for me to "step aside" and a new generation to step forward.

I have notified The Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, our Presiding Bishop, of my intentions and he wants me to assure you of his love and support of our diocese as we enter this time of transition. I cannot express the profound gratitude I feel for the sacred honor and privilege I have had in serving as your bishop. By God's grace, we still have nearly two years to walk together in this work. I look forward to journeying with you and trust that the Holy Spirit will continue to lead, sustain and guide us through it all. May God bless you and those you love.
