
Second Reading 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

Reader A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Church in Corinth.

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.







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Lectionary & Liturgy

The feast of the Epiphany directed our attention to the ways in which Christ is manifest in the Gospels, and by extension, how he is manifest in our lives. The theme of showing forth is continued in the Sundays after the Epiphany. The Old Testament used the marriage relationship and the marriage feast as symbols or archetypes of God's relationship to the chosen people and of the ultimate consummation of that relationship in the establishment of the Kingdom. Today's passage from Isaiah is based on that image. God's gifts of grace to us are also the focus of today's reading from I Corinthians. This reading is the first in a series from this Epistle exploring the kinds of gifts we received when we were baptized by water and the Holy Spirit, and the results of God's gifts in our lives.

Today's Gospel carries the third of the three classical themes of Epiphany: Jesus' first miracle, changing water into wine at the marriage feast in Cana of Galilee. At the marriage feast, Jesus produced around 150 gallons of wine (God is lavish, even profligate, in giving grace) and it is much better wine than the host at the dinner had been serving (God's grace far surpasses what we can do for ourselves).

We are a people transformed by our relationship to God and given the grace and illumination of the Holy Spirit. The marriage images in the first and third readings describe the intimate and total nature of God's relationship to us which results of the gift of the Holy Spirit given us in baptism.

- † Cover art "Water into Wine" © 2022 Hyatt Moore Oil over Acrylic on Canvas. An occasional painter, he began in earnest in 1996, first focusing on international peoples, then to full time occupation in 2004, with an ever-broadening array of subjects and approaches.
- † Prelude Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954) retired in 2020 after 30 years at Hood College in Frederick, MD, where he served as Chair of the Music Department and Professor of Music. He continues at Hood College as College Organist and Instructor of Organ, Harpsichord, and Composition. He is a parish musician and since 2013 is Director of Music Ministry at First Lutheran Church of Ellicott City, MD.
- † Gathering Hymn Words & Music: Kathleen Thomerson (b. 1934) © 1970, 1975, Celebration, Aliquippa, PA. "On one, hand it may be sung as a prayer for illumination. On the other hand, it may be sung as a song of dedication. The worshiper commits to live in the light of Christ." Currently Organist and Music Director at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Austin, TX, this was written in the summer of 1966 when she was a part of the charismatic group at the Church of the Redeemer, Episcopal in Houston, the town after which she named the tune.
- † Opening Acclamation (et al.) Emriching Our Worship is a collection of supplemental liturgical materials representing the recovery of ancient biblical and patristic images, including the identification of Christ with Wisdom and language for God that does not use familiar masculine terms. The liturgical texts reflect the influence of the prayer experience of women, and a desire to honor that experience while remaining faithful to the liturgical prayer as received by the Church.
- † Collect for Purity The name traditionally given to the collect prayed near the beginning of the Eucharist in most Anglican rites. It appears in Latin in the 11th-century missal and was part of the preparation prayers of priests before Mass. Thomas Cranmer translated the prayer into English and from there it has entered almost every Anglican prayer book in the world.
- † Gloria Words: Anonymous, 15th cent. medieval. Music: Robert Powell (b. 1932,) an American composer and organist "whose output bridges denominational boundaries and serves the larger Church. He has made ecumenical sharing a reality and always with a genteel touch." [GIA] His conservative, neo-Romantic style stems from his approach to composition. "I write for choirs of 25 because that's what most are. Most are not of cathedral ability or size. My pieces are practical and useful for specific occasions."–[© Church Publishing]
- † Collect of the Day New to this edition of the BCP, this collect is based upon one in the Book of Common Worship of the Church of South India. Like many of the post-Epiphany collects, this relates to the Gospel of the day. -[Notes on the American Prayer Book by Marion Hatchett]
- † Proclaiming Hymn Words: Medieval Latin, 9th century, translated by John Mason Neale (1818-1866); this is his translation of 'Aeterne Rex altissime' the anonymous Latin hymn for Ascensiontide. Music: Percy Carter Buck (1871-1947), director of music at Harrow School, wrote it for "The royal banners forward go" (gonfalon is an ancient Anglo-Norman word meaning banner).
- † Gospel The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn't just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was more like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal who was hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, "a famished land." It was, he said, like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there before.
- * Nicene Creed This version is designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (filioque) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition of that phrase was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without the approval of a General Council.
- † **Prayers of the People -** Adapted from Raymond Chapman, author of books of prayer and devotion, and greatly loved parish priest; adapted from Leading Intercessions: Prayers for Sundays, Holy Days and Festivals and for Special Services Years A, B & C -[Hymns Ancient and Modern].
- † Offertory Hymn Words: Rusty Edwards. Music: folk melody named for a province in Finland, first published with a hymn text in an appendix to the 1909 edition of the Finnish Suomen Evankelis Luterilaisen Kirken Koraalikirja.
- † Communion Hymn Words: Horatius Bonar (1808-1889). Music: Sidney Watson (1903-1991)...
- † Sending Hymn Words: Walter Chalmers Smith (1824-1908). Music: Welsh hymn adapted in 1839 by John Roberts (1822-1877).
