This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God; there is also one mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all—this was attested at the right time. For this I was appointed a herald and an apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.'

Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.'

And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own?

No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

## Spiritual Reflection: Preparing for the Gospel

This week, the spiritual reflection, focused on the Gospel, confronts us with the parable of the dishonest manager from Luke 16:1-13. This difficult to comprehend text brings to mind Winston Churchill's phrase; "It's a riddle wrapped in a mystery inside an enigma..." Condensed to its simplest form the parable is about a business manager (steward, oikonomos) who engages in questionable conduct that damages his boss financially, yet wins praise from his boss!? C. H. Dodd — the New Testament scholar and influential Protestant theologian — observed that even Luke seems confused as to what to do with the parable, providing at least three interpretations at the parable's conclusion: (1) that the children of light should learn from the prudence of their corrupt neighbors; (2) to make friends by means of dishonest wealth; and (3) that if one wishes to be entrusted with true riches, one must demonstrate honesty with ordinary wealth. Parables like this compel us to acknowledge that our worldview is formed far more from our society than from our membership in God's Kingdom. The parable is strange and difficult for us to comprehend because we are so 'invested' in, and formed by, our monetary systems. Systems that would obviously condemn the dishonest manager. But for a Galilean peasant, living under crushing debt, the manager who reduces 'dishonest interest' to a fair amount is obviously the one who should be lauded, even though he acts from self-interest...

#### **Cover Art**

"Parable of the Dishonest Steward" by Eugène Burnand: Illustration for the parable in Luke 16: 1-13, commonly known as the Parable of the Dishonest Steward, by Swiss artist Eugène Burnand (1850-1921). These images, along with 80 others, were published in *Les Paraboles*, a 1908 French language book of the parables of Jesus. A deeply religious man, his Protestant beliefs led him to include more religious works that he put his stamp of realism on, and he became best known in Europe for his illustrations of "The Parables", that was published in French, German and English versions over four decades.

## **Lectionary & Liturgy**

In the liturgy, the spiritual and the material are joined in Holy Communion. This reflects the Christian concern with both matter and spirit. We cannot be faithful to the gospel if we limit our values to either one alone. Today's gospel reading about the unjust steward makes the point that how we use our material wealth is directly related to our relationship with God. If a "worldly" person like the steward uses money to secure friends, how much more should we, the children of God, use our material wealth to gain favor with God and our fellow human beings.

The first reading from Jeremiah reveals how the message of God rejecting the kingdom of Judah pained him. The prophet laments the state of his people even though he knows that their suffering is a result of their own choice to reject their God and their refusal to repent. Today we continue the series of readings from the first epistle to Timothy. These letters, written after Paul's death by his followers, give practical advice to Christian communities about church life. The church is to be an intercessory body of people who, through their prayer for all persons (even the emperor, their enemy), are the means of bringing about God's salvation.

God's love is for all of creation and we are called in both liturgical worship and daily living to be God's instrument in bringing everything and everyone into God's Kingdom.
