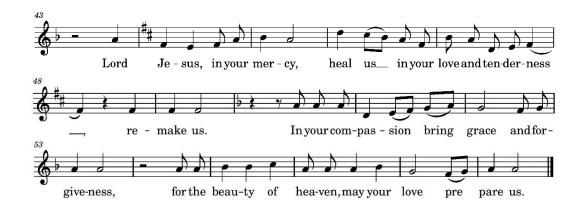

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Reader A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

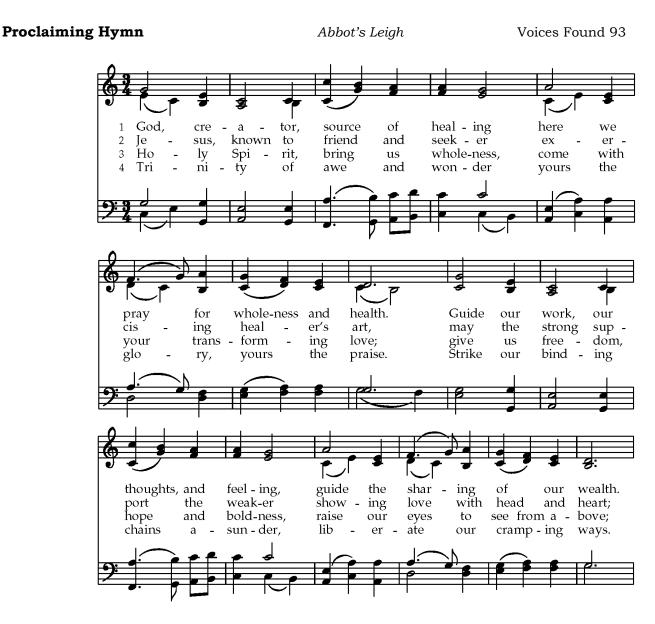
Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him. Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth – as in fact there are many gods and many lords – yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed.

But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

Holy Gospel Mark 1:21-28

Jesus and his disciples went into Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. 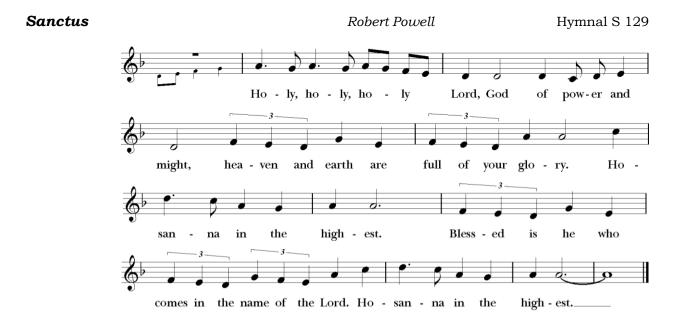
People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice For the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

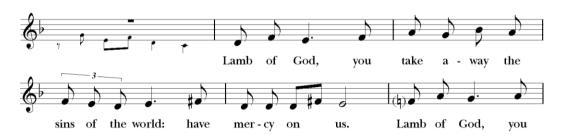

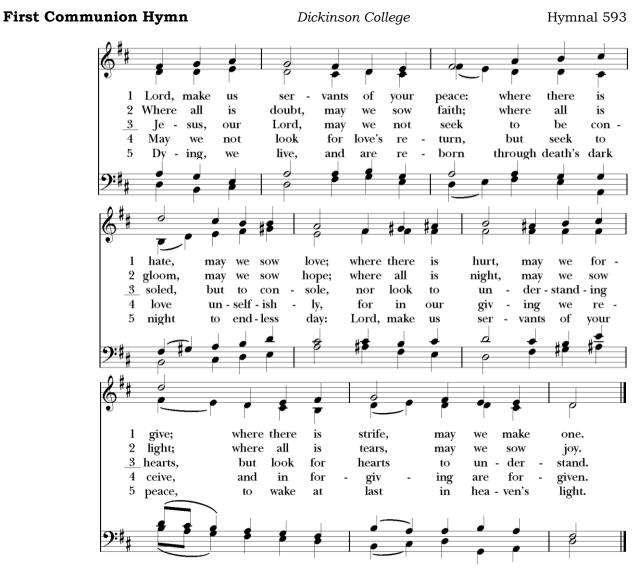

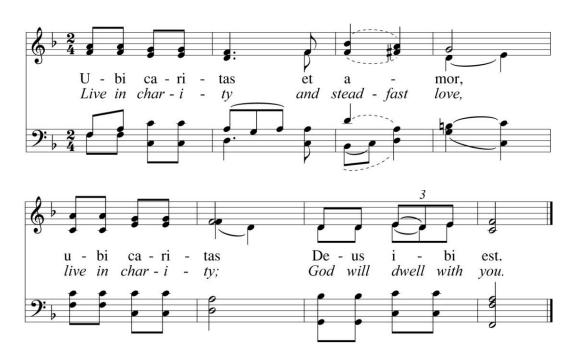

The online meetings will begin on Thursday, February 22 and conclude on Thursday, March 21.

Lectionary & Liturgy

In Epiphany season we celebrate those events in Jesus' ministry which revealed him to be the Son of God. Today we hear Mark's account of Jesus' first sermon and the events which followed. In casting out an evil spirit from one possessed, Jesus revealed a spiritual authority greater than that of other prophets and teachers.

The reading from Deuteronomy preserves an ancient Hebrew tradition that God would send another prophet as great as Moses. While Christians have seen Jesus as the fulfillment of that tradition, he was, in fact, even greater than Moses. Those who were in the synagogue at Capernaum realized that his power over evil spirits revealed him to be the agent of God.

Our reading from I Corinthians today deals with an extremely important part of Paul's teaching about the Church by means of a rather obscure (to us) controversy in that Church. It was between those who had no qualms about eating food sacrificed to pagan gods, because they believed Christ had rendered such gods meaningless; and those who feared that eating such food would put them back into the fellowship of the old gods. Paul's principle is that we are indeed free to eat any food (the old gods are meaningless) but that the need for unity and fellowship among Christians is even more important than exercising that freedom.

We join together in the liturgy to meet our Savior who comes to us in Word and Sacrament. Jesus, then, is not only the prophet who, like Moses, brings God's Word; he is the Word made flesh who comes among us himself in water, bread, and wine.

- † Cover art "Exorcising a boy possessed by a demon" from *Très Riches Heures du Duc de Berry*; a collection of prayers to be said at the canonical hours, created ~1414 for the extravagant royal bibliophile and patron John, Duke of Berry, by the Limbourg brothers.
- † Gathering Hymn Words: Samuel John Stone (1839-1900) from hymns based on the Apostles' Creed. In the mid-19th century, the Anglican bishop of Natal, South Africa expressed critical views of Scripture and the Christian faith. English cleric Stone defended the orthodoxy with *Lyra Fidelium; 12 Hymns on the 12 Articles of the Apostles' Creed.* –[*Psalter Hymnal Handbook*] Music: Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876); though opinions vary (Henry J. Gauntlett deemed it 'inartistic, secular twaddle'), it has been firmly associated with this text since they first appeared together in the 1868 edition of *Hymns Ancient and Modern.* –[Laura de Jong, Hymnary.org]
- † Opening Acclamation (et al.) *Enriching Our Worship* is a collection of supplemental liturgical materials representing the recovery of ancient biblical and patristic images, including the identification of Christ with Wisdom and language for God that does not use familiar masculine terms. The liturgical texts reflect the influence of the prayer experience of women, and a desire to honor that experience while faithful to the liturgical prayer as received by the Church.
- † Collect for Purity Prayed near the beginning in most Anglican rites. It appears in Latin in the 11th century missal and was part of the preparation prayers of priests before Mass. Thomas Cranmer translated the prayer into English and from there it has entered almost every Anglican prayer book in the world.
- † Canticle Q Setting: © 2002 Jonathan Dimmock; he is the Principal Organist at the Legion of Honor Museum, Organist for the San Francisco Symphony, and Music Director at Congregation Sherith Israel. A graduate of Oberlin and Yale, he has also served three American cathedrals: St. John the Divine (New York), St. Mark's (Minneapolis), and Grace (San Francisco). He is deeply committed to healing our world through the beauty of music, and talks eagerly on the subjects of spirituality, psychology, aesthetics, and the arts.
- † **Collect of the Day** This is found in the Gregorian sacramentary; Thomas Cranmer translated the petition "grant us thy peace all the days of our life," but this revision restores the original wording. –[*Notes on the American Prayer Book* by Marion Hatchett]
- † Plainsong Psalter Editor/choral director James Litton was on the Standing Commission on Church Music, publishing the *Hymnal 1982*, and a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music, one of only 7 Americans to receive this honor. –[© 1988 Church Pension Fund]
- † Proclaiming Hymn Words: © Brigid Pailthorp (extensive research has turned up no information on her); each verse has an attribute of the three persons of the Holy Trinity. –[©1970 Church Publishing] Music: Cyril Vincent Taylor (1907-1992), Anglican priest; former Warden of the Royal School of Church Music in England. For many years he served as a proprietor of *Hymns Ancient & Modern*, playing a major editorial role in compiling two supplements and *The New Standard Edition*; named for a village near Bristol, England, where he composed the tune when he was working for the Religious Broadcasting Department of the BBC. [© 1942, ren. 1970 Hope Publishing] "No modern hymnal would want to omit this great twentieth-century tune! –[*Psalter Hymnal Handbook*]
- † Nicene Creed This version is designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (*filioque*) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without approval of a General Council.
- † Offertory Anthem Words: Beth Rice Luttrell. Music: Benjamin Harlan sensitive treatment of a familiar folk tune.

- † Offertory Hymn Words: Stanzas 1-3, Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885) wrote, "It is a recapitulation of the successive manifestations of Christ, which have already been presented in the services of the former weeks throughout the season of Epiphany; and anticipation of that future great and glorious Epiphany, at which Christ will be manifest to all, when he will appear again to judge the world." Stanza 4, F. Bland Tucker (1895-1984) [© The Church Pension Fund]. Music: melody Jakob Hintze (1622-1702); partly as a result of the Thirty Years' War and partly to further his musical education, he traveled widely as a youth, including trips to Sweden and Lithuania. In 1659 he settled in Berlin, where he served as court musician and is known for editing later editions of Johann Crüger's *Praxis Pietatis Melica* (he contributed 65 original tunes). Harmony by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750).

He has made ecumenical sharing a reality and always with a genteel touch." –[GIA] "I write for choirs of 25 because that's what most are. Most are not of cathedral ability or size. My pieces are practical and useful for specific occasions."–[© Church Publishing]
- † The Lord's Prayer John Dominica Crossan writes "What if the Lord's Prayer is neither a Jewish prayer for Jews nor yet a Christian prayer for Christians? What if it is a prayer from the heart of Judaism on the lips of Christianity for the conscience of the world? What if it is a radical manifesto and a hymn of hope for all humanity in language addressed to all the earth?"
- † First Communion Hymn Words: James Quinn, SJ [© 1969 Geoffrey Chapman, a division of Cassell Ltd.] A Scottish Jesuit priest, theologian and hymnodist, he was one of the leading 20th century hymnwriters in use by Christian denominations throughout the world. Quinn was especially known for promoting ecumenism following the Second Vatican Council. Based on a prayer widely but erroneously attributed to Francis of Assisi, the prayer in its present form cannot be traced back further than 1912, when it was printed in Paris in French. The prayer has been known in the United States since 1927 when its first known translation in English appeared in January of that year in the Quaker magazine *Friends' Intelligencer*, where it was attributed to St. Francis of Assisi. Music: Lee Hastings Bristol, Jr. (1923-1979) [© 1962, Theodore Presser Co.] His great-grandfather was Dr. Thomas Hastings, noted hymnwriter of the 19th century; his father was co-founder of the Bristol-Myers Company. Hastings spent 15 years in the family business, but from 1962-69, he served as president of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. In 1972, the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada made him a fellow of the society.
- † Second Communion Hymn Words: Johann Franck (1618-1677); "an exhortation to the soul to arise and draw near to partake of the Heavenly Food and to meditate on the wonders of Heavenly Love; ending with a prayer for final reception at the Eternal Feast." –[John Julian, A Dictionary of Hymnology 1906] A significant poet, he wrote 110 hymns, many published by his friend Johann Crüger in various editions of the Praxis Pietatis melica. "He holds a high rank and is distinguished for unfeigned and firm faith, deep earnestness, finished form, and noble, pithy, simplicity of expression." Music: melody Johann Crüger (1598-1662); harm. The English Hymnal, 1906. The tune name is the incipit of the original German text. JS Bach used this tune in his Cantata 180; he and many other composers have written organ preludes on the melody. Since the 1653 Gesangbuch, the hymn has appeared in virtually all German hymnals and in many English language ones.
- † Communion Meditation Words: Taizé Community. Music: Jacques Berthier (1923-1994) [© 1982 Les Presses de Taizé, GIA]
- † Sending Hymn Words: George William Kitchin (1827-1912), inspired by the story of Constantine the Great's conversion to Christianity after seeing a cross with *In hoc signo vinces* ("In this Sign Conquer") on it. Music: Sydney Hugo Nicholson (1875-1947). [Both ©1974 Hope Publishing Co.] Stanley L. Osbourne wrote the "images are biblical, its moods expectant, its promises courageous, and its demands costly" and sees the cross as a symbol of the love of Jesus. However, Gail Ramshaw sees it as an endorsement of the Gospel of John's description of the Passion and focuses on the cross as a source of agony rather than as a throne of Jesus.

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
