Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little."

One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted.

When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them.

The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

- ✠ *The Presider gives the Bread to each person saying: 'The Body of Christ.' The recipient replies: 'Amen.'*
- ✠ *Consume the Bread at the rail and then return to your seat.*

Lectionary & Liturgy

Today we begin a five-week period in which the gospel readings each Sunday are focused on Jesus' feeding 5,000 people with five loaves and two fish, the response of the disciples and the crowds, and Jesus' discourse on himself as the bread of life. It is from the apostolic memory of this event and the Gospel of John's exposition of its meaning that the early Church began to develop its understanding of the meaning of the Eucharist. Note that Jesus performed the Eucharistic actions with the loaves and fish; he took, he blessed, he broke, and he gave.

In a story strikingly similar to the feeding of the 5,000, the prophet Elisha shows God's generosity when a crowd is fed from a seemingly insufficient supply of food. Throughout the sacred story, God's care for us is described in miracles of feeding. In today's reading from Ephesians, the writer prays that the people may be strengthened by God's Spirit so that Christ may dwell in them and that we may find ourselves living in God and rejoicing in God's power working through us.

We are met by God in the Eucharist. Our baptismal state is renewed. We remember what God has done for us in Christ. We remember who we are. We are filled once again with the Spirit. We are fed in the mysteries of Christ's Body and Blood. We are reconstituted as God's People.

- † **Cover art** – “Feeding of the 5,000” by Dirk A. Walker (b. 1954, Alabama). “The paintings have evolved from a God centered Faith; although it’s been a lifelong struggle. I think growing up in the South, with a mother that drugged us to church every time the doors were open, was the foundation and inspiration to hopefully uplift and give hope to the viewer.”
- † **Opening Acclamation** (et al.) – *Enriching Our Worship* is a collection of supplemental liturgical materials representing the recovery of ancient biblical and patristic images, including the identification of Christ with Wisdom and language for God that does not use familiar masculine terms. The liturgical texts reflect the influence of the prayer experience of women, and a desire to honor that experience while remaining faithful to the liturgical prayer as received by the Church.
- † **Collect of the Day** – In keeping with the Reformation emphasis on faith, Thomas Cranmer reworked a previous collect by substituting “trust” for “hope” and omitting the qualifying adjective “good,” so it applies to times of adversity as well as prosperity. —[*Notes on the American Prayer Book* by Marion Hatchett]
- † **Gospel** – The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn’t just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was more like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal who was hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, “a famished land.” It was, he would later testify, like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there before.
- † *** Nicene Creed** – This version is designed to contain “all the expansive language texts currently authorized.” It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words ‘and the Son’ (*filioque*) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition of that phrase was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without the approval of a General Council.
- † **Prayers of the People** – Adapted from “Leading Intercessions: Prayers for Sundays, Holy Days and Festivals and for Special Services Years A, B & C” by Raymond Chapman —[*Hymns Ancient and Modern, Ltd., Kindle Edition*]. Author of many books of prayer and devotion, and a greatly loved parish priest; he died in 2013. “A must for anyone leading intercessions in the Church of England. Prayers can be easily adapted to local contexts. They reflect the Bible readings of the day, creating a more integrated act of worship. A trusted liturgical resource for many years, regularly used in hundreds of parishes, this continues to be the essential handbook for Lectionary-based intercessions.” —[Barnes & Noble]
- † **Preface & Commissioning** – Written by the Rev. Nathan Nettleton for LaughingBird Liturgical Resources as “a gift to the wider Church from the South Yarra Community Baptist Church in Melbourne, Australia.”
- † **Sending Hymn** – Words: William Williams (1717-1791); the most famous hymn writer of Welsh Methodism, the “sweet singer of Wales” interweaves imagery from Exodus to evoke a sense of God’s guidance through strife. He made an extraordinary record as an itinerant evangelist; taking the whole of Wales for his parish, he traveled for 43 years, an average of 2230 miles a year, at a time when there were no railroads and few stage-coaches. Music: John Hughes (1873-1932) named the tune after a coal mining area in Wales. A Welsh composer of hymn tunes, he worked his entire life in secular jobs, his worldwide fame being the result of a hobby he pursued on the side. The hymn was sung at the 1997 funeral of Princess Diana and the royal wedding of Prince William and Catherine Middleton in 2011.

- Those who are fully vaccinated are not required to wear masks, indoors or out.
- Any individual may choose to wear a mask at any time, and should not be questioned about their reasons for doing so.
- Individuals not fully vaccinated must wear a mask at any gathering of the congregation or on church property, whether indoors or outside.
- Physically distanced seating will be maintained in the church building until at least the end of June and then be reassessed.
- Sign up for in-person services will continue for the month of July.
- Encourage all who can be vaccinated to get vaccinated to care for the whole Body of Christ and for the whole human community.
