
O that my head were a spring of water, and my eyes a fountain of tears, so that I might weep day and night for the slain of my poor people!

Reader A reading from Paul's first letter to Timothy.



So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.'

"And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Lectionary & Liturgy

In the liturgy, the spiritual and the material are joined in Holy Communion. This reflects the Christian concern with both matter and spirit. We cannot be faithful to the gospel if we limit our values to either one alone. Today's gospel reading about the unjust steward makes the point that how we use our material wealth is directly related to our relationship with God. If a "worldly" person like the steward uses money to secure friends, how much more should we, the children of God, use our material wealth to gain favor with God and our fellow human beings.

The first reading from Jeremiah reveals how the message of God rejecting the kingdom of Judah pained him. The prophet laments the state of his people even though he knows that their suffering is a result of their own choice to reject their God and their refusal to repent. Today we continue the series of readings from the first epistle to Timothy. These letters, written after Paul's death by his followers, give practical advice to Christian communities about church life. The church is to be an intercessory body of people who, through their prayer for all persons (even the emperor, their enemy), are the means of bringing about God's salvation.

God's love is for all of creation and we are called in both liturgical worship and daily living to be God's instrument in bringing everything and everyone into God's Kingdom.

- † Plainsong Psalter Editor and choral director James Litton was on the Standing Commission on Church Music, publishing *Hymnal* 1982 and Fellow of Royal School of Church Music, one of 7 Americans to receive the honor. [© 1988 Church Pension Fund]
- † Proclaiming Hymn Words: Irish, ca. 700 AD; versified Mary Elizabeth Byrne (1880-1931). Music: Irish ballad.
- † * Nicene Creed Designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (*filioque*) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at

the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition of that phrase was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without the approval of a General Council.

- † Offertory Anthem "One Faith, One Hope, One Lord" with music and text by Craig Courtney, based on Ephesians 4.
- † Offertory Hymn Words: Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000) –[©1970 Hope Publishing]. Erik Routley considered him to be the most important British hymn writer since Charles Wesley. His hymns reject fundamentalism and show concern with social issues. They "fill the gap between the hymns of the first part of this century and the 'far-out' compositions that have crowded into some churches in the last decade or more." Regarding hymn singing, "It's such a dangerous activity; you get this glow which you can mistake for religious experience." Music: Francis Jackson; born in 1917, he passed away in January 2022 at 104 years old. –[©1960]
- † Proper Preface Nathan Nettleton is pastor to South Yarra Community Baptist Church, located in an inner-city neighborhood of Melbourne, Australia; he also writes and teaches on Christian worship and Baptist identity. His website provides liturgical resources from which we have drawn this preface. –[© 2001 LaughingBird]
- † First Communion Hymn Words: Albert Bayly (1901-1984); based on Micah 6:6-8, he presents the prophet "in the light of the climax and fulfillment of the Old Testament revelation in the coming of Christ." It asks questions and states commands as if Micah were a modern-day prophet. Bayly wrote, "hymns may deal with the most profound ideas, but unless these are expressed in the simplest and clearest possible way they can be nothing but words to many of those who sing them." He used more contemporary language and concepts "embodying space-age imagery and warnings of nuclear destruction., marking a resurgence of the social gospel hymn." –[Carlton Young] "The pioneer of the remarkable revival of hymn writing in Britain in the 1960s and 1970s." –[Fred Pratt Green] –[©1949 Oxford University Press] Music: Eric Routley (1917-1982) –[©1969 Hope Publishing]. "One of Routley's best! The rugged tune fits well with the stern prophetic message." –[Psalter Hymnal Handbook]
- † Second Communion Hymn Words: Jeffrey Rowthorn (1934-2025). –[© 1979 Hymn Society of America] Music: David Hurd (b. 1960).
- † Communion Meditation Words: Latin, 8th century. Music: Jacques Berthier (1923-1994) –[©1978, 1980, 1981, Les Presses de Taizé, GIA]
- **Sending Hymn** Words: Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969) was a well-known and controversial preacher in the early twentieth century. After Fosdick left his position at one church, John D. Rockefeller asked him to become pastor of Park Avenue Baptist Church in NYC, but Fosdick thought the church was too wealthy, and agreed only on condition that a new church would be built in a less fashionable place. The site selected for Riverside Church was on the banks of the Hudson, not far from Harlem. Music: John Hughes (1873-1932), a Welshman who spent most of his life as a railway worker. This tune was at first circulated in leaflet form because hymnal editors considered it too vigorous to be a proper hymn tune. They eventually succumbed to popular pressure.
- † Postlude from the Suite No. 4 in B-flat major, published in 1947 by Léon Boëllmann, who was born in the Alsace, dying a few weeks after his 35th birthday. "A dedicated teacher, trenchant critic, gifted composer and successful performer who coaxed pleasing sounds out of recalcitrant instruments."
