Second Reading 2 Timothy 2:8-15


Reader A reading from Paul's second letter to Timothy.

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David – that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful – for he cannot deny himself. Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.





He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you.

On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat. This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again, he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Hodegetria Icon During his sabbatical in Greece Fr Andy purchased an Icon of Mary holding Jesus for the parish. The Hodegtria (meaning she who shows the way), refers to a Byzantine iconographic type of the Virgin Mary holding the infant Christ and pointing to him with her hand, thus guiding the viewer to salvation. The icon will be displayed alongside the votive tree (next to the pulpit) in the church. The vestry approved this location for trial use in order to afford the parish an opportunity to venerate or reflect upon this icon while lighting a candle at the votive tree. Fr Andy will facilitate a discussion on the use of icons in worship, and the placement of the Hodogetria in our church on Sunday, November 16 at 11:30 AM in the church. All parishioners are encouraged to read chapters by Rowan Williams and Henri Nouwen; links to them can be found in this week's email blast. Lectionary & Liturgy

In today's liturgy, the central theme is the inclusive nature of God's call to us. Although Judaism and Christianity have at points in history have been presented as limited and exclusive, the word of God in both Testaments is insistent that God calls all people into the Kingdom. In today's gospel, the willingness of the Samaritan leper to recognize Christ (excluded from conventional society because of his ethnicity and his affliction), and Jesus' ministry to him, was used by Jesus as a sign of God's favor to all people. Faith is not limited only to a few special people. The story of Elisha and Naaman is a parallel event to today's Gospel passage. Naaman, also from a foreign and despised people and a leper, is nevertheless healed by the great Hebrew prophet. God's goodness is not only for Jews and Christians but also for all people. In the reading from II Timothy we have instructions to an early church leader concerning the message he is to proclaim and the character of his ministry. Timothy is reminded that God remains faithful to us and that our response is to be faithful to God. In the Eucharist, we join as the people of God. We are set apart by baptism, not as an exclusive society, but are called to be the Spirit's instruments in calling all people into God's family. We are of every race, class, and heritage, yet we are united in Christ as a priestly people sent out to the entire world.

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- † Cover Art "Christ and the Ten Lepers" by Gebhard Fugel (1863–1939), a German painter specializing in Christian themes. He is best known for his work as the leading artist of the *Crucifixion Panorama*, a listed historic monument of Bavaria and the UNESCO.
- † Gathering Hymn Words: John Ellerton (1826-1893); "The words are usually short and simple; the thought is clear and well stated; the rhythm is good and stately. Ordinary facts in sacred history and daily life are lifted above the commonplace rhymes with which they are usually associated, thereby rendering the hymns bearable to the cultured, and instructive to the devout." –[John Julian] Music: Christopher Dearnley (1930-2000), famed organist at the wedding of Charles & Diana in 1981, composed while his wife gave birth to their youngest child; –[by permission Oxford University Press.]
- † Gloria Words: Anonymous, 15th cent. medieval. Music: Robert Powell (b. 1932,) © Church Publishing]
- † Collect of the Day The prayer is for grace which anticipates us as well as grace which accompanies us that we may be continually dedicated to good works—"prevenient" and "cooperating" grace. –[Notes on the American Prayer Book by Marion Hatchett]
- † Plainsong Psalter Editor and choral director James Litton was on the Standing Commission on Church Music, publishing Hymnal 1982 and Fellow of Royal School of Church Music, one of 7 Americans to receive the honor. —[©1988 Church Pension Fund]
- † **Proclaiming Hymn** Words: Martin Rinckart (1586-1649). During the height of a severe plague in 1637, he was the only surviving pastor in Eilenburg, conducting as many as 50 funerals in a day. He performed more than 4000 funerals in that year, including that of his wife. Music: Johann Cruger (1598-1662); harm. William Henry Monk (1823-1889).
- † * Nicene Creed Designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (filioque) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition was implemented only in the Western Church without approval of General Council.
- † Offertory Anthem Martin Edward Fallas Shaw (1875–1958) was an English composer and conductor He studied under Charles Villiers Stanford at the Royal College of Music, together with a generation of composers that included Gustav Holst, Ralph Vaughan Williams, and John Ireland. He then embarked upon a career as a theatrical producer, composer and conductor, the early years of which he described as "a long period of starving along." Under the influence of his wife, and faced with the need to support his family, church music gradually became the focus of his life and work. His over 300 published works include songs, hymns, carols, oratorios, several instrumental works, a congregational mass setting (the Anglican Folk Mass), and four operas including a ballad opera. He was the only composer T.S. Eliot ever allowed to set his words to music.
- † Offertory Hymn Words: Timothy Dudley-Smith (1926-2016); free paraphrase of the Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-55), one of his first hymn texts and his best known. It was first published in the Anglican Hymn Book (1965). "I did not think of myself as having in any way the gifts of a hymn-writer when in May 1961 I jotted down a set of verses, beginning "Tell out, my soul." I was reading the New English Bible New Testament, where that line appears exactly as I have put it; I saw in it the first line, and speedily wrote the rest." –[© 1962 Hope Publishing] Music: Walter Greatorex (1877-1949); the title refers to one of the schoolhouses at Gresham's School, Holt, Norfolk, where he was director of music from 1911-1936. –[By permission of Oxford University Press]
- † Proper Preface Nathan Nettleton is pastor to South Yarra Community Baptist Church, located in an inner-city neighborhood of Melbourne, Australia; he also writes and teaches on Christian worship and Baptist identity. His website provides liturgical resources. [© 2001 Laughing Bird]
- † First Communion Hymn Words: Louis Benson (1855-1930); "As a hymn writer Dr. Benson is not widely known, mainly through the recent publication of his verse. His hymns deserve attention, and will, no doubt, gain the public ear in due time; whilst his hymnological researches and publications are thorough and praiseworthy." –[John Julian, Dictionary of Hymnology, New Supplement (1907)] Music: melody David Gregor Corner (1585-1648), German Benedictine abbot, hymn writer and theologian best known for his influential Gross Catholisches Gesängbuch. He initially considered leaving out "all hymns found in heretical collections" but a colleague reminded him that hymns of Martin Luther and other Protestants were derived from earlier Catholic melodies, and "it was in no way desirable to leave out such good old hymns simply because they have been used by the enemies of the true faith and falsely ascribed to them." - † Postlude—Suite gothique, Op. 25 is a suite for organ composed by Léon Boëllmann (1862-1897); it is his most famous work and was composed exactly 130 years ago, 1895.
