II. Proclaiming and Receiving the Word of God

First Reading Acts 10:34-43

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles:

"I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all.

"That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him.

"We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

"He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Reader A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.


Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you – unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died.

Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them – though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." And all that had been commanded them they told briefly to those around Peter. And afterward Jesus himself sent out through them, from east to west, the sacred and imperishable proclamation of eternal salvation.






It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever.

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures.

When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy.

To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new. And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup,

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever.



Postlude Toccata from the "Symphony for Organ No. 5" - Charles-Marie Widor "The resurrection of Jesus changes the face of death for all His people. Death is no longer a prison, but a passage into God's presence. If Easter says anything to us today, it says this: You can put truth in a grave, but it won't stay there. You can nail it to a cross, wrap it in winding sheets and shut it up in a tomb, but it will rise! — Clarence W. Hall

This is the Feast of the Lord's Resurrection. Today the Church completes its three great days of celebrating redemption. Since Maundy Thursday we have been involved in an extended liturgy which will be brought to its conclusion today. This is the celebration of the Passover of Christ from death to life. It is also the celebration of our own Passover in Holy Baptism in which "we were buried with Christ in his death and raised with him." Throughout the fifty days of Easter, the first reading on Sundays is from the Acts of the Apostles. These weekly readings from Acts describe the life of the first Christians and their proclamation of Christ's resurrection. So today we hear a portion of the sermon Peter preached to Cornelius, the first Gentile Christian. The passage from I Corinthians contains Paul's witness to Jesus' resurrection as it was told him by the other apostles. He concludes with his own experience of Jesus' appearance to him. The Gospel reading from Mark describes the women coming to the tomb and finding it empty. A young man clad in a white robe – a baptismal symbol – tells them that Christ is risen and sends them to tell the disciples. As we rejoice in our new life in the risen Christ on this day, he comes among us and is made known to us in the Breaking of the Bread. We, like Mary and the other women, are sent forth to tell others of his resurrection.

- † Cover art "He is Risen" by Ivanka Demchuk. "The aim of my icons is a new display of religious essence, researching principles of interpretation without losing sacral significance. An icon should evolve, implementing the best aesthetic achievements of the time; then it is closer to the way modern humans perceive the world"
- † Gathering Hymn Words: Latin, 14th cent.; tr. Lyra Davidica, 1708. Music: adapt. and harm. The Compleat Psalmodist, 1749.
- † Service Music William Mathias (1934-1992) © 1976 Oxford University Press. "Music was an ever-present force for my father. I was aware from a very early age that the creative process was something always present for him even when he was doing something else and that it was a force which he could turn in any desired direction or channel at a given time. Hence his ability to compose a wide variety of orchestral, choral, instrumental or chamber music, as well as music for the church and for young people." –[daughter Rhiannon Mathias]
- † Collect of the Day The 1549 Book provided it for use on Easter Day; but it does not appear in the Prayer Book again until the 1892 revision. Its content makes it a fitting transition from the time of meditation upon the passion to the celebration of the resurrection. –[Marion Hatchett]
- † Acts of the Apostles This book with its description of the life of early Christian community, characterized by an intense awareness of the risen Lord's presence and the apostolic preaching of the Resurrection, has had an important place in the church's liturgy. In recent years, the liturgical revisions among Anglicans, Roman Catholics, and Lutherans have placed it again in the Easter liturgy.
- † Plainsong Psalter Plainsong dates from the earliest centuries of Christianity. It has one melody traditionally sung without musical accompaniment and based on the psalms. Editor James Litton is widely recognized as one of the leading American choral conductors.
- † Nicene Creed Contains "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the BCP version. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (filioque) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition was a later development implemented in the Western Church and without approval of a General Council.
- † **Prayers of the People** It is important to notice that it is not the leader of those prayers who does the praying. That person whether ordained or not simply announces the theme, and all of us, the baptized royal priesthood, pray in the power of the Spirit to the Father.
- † Offertory Anthem Words: Exodus 15:21,4 and Robert Campbell (1814-1868). Composer Edward Cuthbert Bairstow (1874-1948); one of the 20th century's outstanding organist-composers, his biographer Francis Jackson wrote of "his ability to do supremely well at whatever he put his hand to. I never heard him play a wrong note." Notorious for his terseness and bluntness, Bairstow did not always endear himself to others. Asked whether he would be willing to emigrate to the United States, he replied that he would "rather go to the devil."
- † First Communion Hymn Words: Donald Fishel (b. 1950); Luke 24:46-48; Romans 6:2-4; Colossians 1:15-16. Brought up a Methodist, he turned to Roman Catholicism in 1969. Music: Betty Pulkingham, Charles Mallory and George Mims; arrangement © 1979, Celebration Music.
- † Second Communion Hymn Words: Latin, 1632; tr. Robert Campbell (1814-1868). Music: melody Jakob Hintze (1622-1702); harm. J.S. Bach. Hintze traveled widely as a youth, including trips to Sweden and Lithuania. In 1659 he settled in Berlin; he is known mainly for his editing of the later editions of Johann Crüger's *Praxis Pietatis Melica*, to which he contributed some sixty-five of his original tunes.
- † Post-Communion Anthem Messiah is an English-language oratorio composed in 1741 by George Frideric Handel, with scriptural text from the King James Bible, and Coverdale Psalter (the version in the BCP 1662). First performed in Dublin in 1742 and London 1743 to a modest public reception, it gained in popularity, eventually becoming one of the best-known and most frequently performed choral works in Western music.
- † Sending Hymn Words: John of Damascus (8th cent.) called "the last but one of the Fathers of the Greek Church, and the greatest of her poets" by translator John Mason Neale (1818-1866). Music: an anonymous tune with German Roman Catholic origins, 1784.
- † Postlude The Symphony for Organ No. 5 in F minor, Op. 42, No. 1, was composed by Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) in 1879, with numerous revisions published by the composer in later years. The fifth movement is his most famous piece. Its fame in part comes from its frequent use as recessional music at festive Christmas and wedding ceremonies. The melody of Widor's Toccata is based upon an arrangement of rapid staccato arpeggios which form phrases.
