Lectionary & Liturgy

This Sunday of Easter is traditionally called "Good Shepherd Sunday." Each year we hear a part of Jesus' discourse on his relationship to us in the image of the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd loves his sheep so much that he lays down his life for them. We are called by him into his life, the life which he has given for us. Today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles continues the story of the first days of the Church. Peter and the other Apostles are on trial before the rulers of the people because in spite of being commanded to speak no more of Jesus, they had continued to preach and to heal in his name. Today we hear portion of Peter's response.

The reading today from I John tells us that as God's children we are to reveal God's love by living in love with all other people. That love is to be more than a kind feeling. We cannot claim to have God's love if we do not care for the needs of our poor and neglected brothers and sisters. Our identity now comes from God and our lives are to reflect God's own nature and love. How we live reveals our relationship to God. Thus the description of the Church as the Body of Christ is not merely an analogy. It describes our life together as the embodiment of Christ's love and mercy toward all people. We are not only "the sheep of his pasture," but we are to shepherd all his people in his name.

- † Cover art "Christ as the Good Shepherd" by Lucas Cranach (1515-1586). At a dinner speech in 1533, Martin Luther remarked that "M. Lucas depicted Christ carrying the sheep out of the desert (*M. Lucas pingat Christum ovem e deserto humeris reportantem*)" He was referring to Lucas Cranach the Elder, but by whom no such work is known. This is stylistically indebted to him; however the characteristic depiction of the winged serpent in the background indicates that it is undoubtedly the work of his son, commonly called "Cranach the Younger." –[Michaelis, *Exhibit Catalogue*, Berlin 1989; note artist's insignia top right, behind the lamb]
- † Gathering Hymn Words: Latin, 1632; tr. Robert Campbell (1814-1868). Music: melody Jakob Hintze (1622-1702); harm. J.S. Bach. Hintze traveled widely as a youth, including trips to Sweden and Lithuania. In 1659 he settled in Berlin; he is known mainly for his editing of the later editions of Johann Crüger's *Praxis Pietatis Melica*, to which he contributed some sixty-five of his original tunes.

- † Service Music William Mathias (1934-1992) –[©1976 Oxford University Press]. "Music was an ever-present force for my father. I was aware from a very early age that the creative process was something always present for him even when he was doing something else and that it was a force which he could turn in any desired direction or channel at a given time. Hence his ability to compose a wide variety of orchestral, choral, instrumental or chamber music, as well as music for the church and for young people." –[daughter Rhiannon Mathias]
- † **Common Worship** A family of volumes which, together with the BCP, make up the official liturgical resource of the Church of England. It represents the most recent stage of development of the Liturgical Movement within the Church.
- † Collect of the Day In many of the ancient baptistries Jesus was depicted as the Good Shepherd, a theme which became associated with one of the Sundays in the Easter season. This new collect, drafted by the Rev. Dr. Massey H. Shepherd, Jr., draws out several aspects of the theme which runs through many of the lections for this day, especially John 10 and Ezekiel 34. –[Notes on the American Prayer Book by Marion Hatchett]
- † Plainsong Psalter Plainsong dates from the earliest centuries of Christianity. It has one melody traditionally sung without musical accompaniment and based on the psalms. Editor James Litton is widely recognized as one of the leading American choral conductors, a member of the Standing Commission on Church Music who participated in the preparation and publication of the Hymnal 1982, directed the American Boychoir (1985-2001), and a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music (one of 7 Americans to receive this honor).
- † Proclaiming Chant Contributors: Jacques Berthier, Taizé Community. Tune: ©1984, Les Presses de Taizé, GIA Publications.
- † Gospel The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn't just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was more like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal who was hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, "a famished land." Like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there before.
- † * Nicene Creed This version is designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (*filioque*) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition of that phrase was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without the approval of a General Council.
- † **Prayers of the People** Note that it is not the leader of those prayers who does the praying. That person whether ordained or not simply announces the theme, and all of us, the baptized royal priesthood, pray in the power of the Spirit to the Father.
- † Offertory Anthem Dr. Michael Bedford (b. 1949), a full-time church musician since 1973, is organist/choirmaster emeritus of St. John's Episcopal in Tulsa, OK; after retirement in 2015, he served as President of the American Guild of Organists from 2016 until 2022. "It has often been said that children and youth are the future of the Church. This is a true statement, but only if children and youth are the 'present' of the Church as well. If they are not taught to serve in leadership capacities in the worship and daily life of today's Church, there will be no future. We need only to examine our own parishes to discover that the young people who continue to attend worship regularly are the same ones who are allowed to participate in leadership capacities. We must continually enable this to happen." –[©2009 Choristers Guild]
- † Offertory Hymn Words: based on Psalm 96. Music: arr. Joe Ridenour.
- † First Communion Hymn Words: Horatius Bonar (1808-1889); "his hymns satisfy the fastidious by their instinctive good taste; they mirror the life of Christ in the soul, partially, perhaps, but with vivid accuracy; they win the heart by their tone of tender sympathy; they sing the truth of God in ringing notes; and although, when taken as a whole, they are not perfect; although, in reading them, we meet with feeble stanzas, halting rhythm, defective rhyme, meaningless iteration; yet a singularly large number have been stamped with approval, both in literary circles and by the Church. –[John Julian, Dictionary of Hymnology 1907] Music: © Sydney Watson (1903-1991).
- † Second Communion Hymn Words: Henry Williams Baker (1821-1877); para. of Psalm 23. "His hymns have an undertone of plaintiveness, and leave a dreamy sadness upon the spirit of the singer. Poetical figures, far-fetched illustrations, and difficult compound words, he entirely eschewed. If a subject presented itself to his mind with striking contrasts of lights and shadows, he almost invariably sought shelter in the shadows." –[John Julian, *Dictionary of Hymnology*, 1903] Music: Irish melody; its first appearance in a hymnal, and apparently its first known appearance in print, was in the *Irish Church Hymnal* (1864), where it was called a "Hymn of the Ancient Irish Church".
- † Communion Meditation Words: Daniel 3, Taizé Community. Music: Jacques Berthier (1923-1994). ©1984 Les Presses de Taize, GIA Publications]
- Sending Hymn Words: Venantius Honorius Fortunatus (540-600); one of the most prominent poets of his time, he filled a great social desire for Latin poetry and used it to promote political ideas he supported, and to pass on personal thoughts and communications. He was a master wordsmith and because of his promotion of the church, as well as the Roman tendencies of the Frankish royalty, he remained in favor with most of his acquaintances throughout his lifetime.
