People We recall Christ's blessed passion and death.


We celebrate Christ's glorious resurrection and ascension.





Wine is offered by way of a sip from the common cup. You may choose to receive only the host. Gluten-free wafers are available by request to the priest.



Diocesan Convention Follow-Up: Migration with Dignity

On November 22, 2025, our Diocesan Convention passed **Resolution 242-1**, *Migration with Dignity* which "[calls] upon Episcopalians in the Diocese to advocate for the passage of **S3672/A4987** the **New Jersey Immigrant Trust Act** which would legally establish some Migration with Dignity principles within our State."

The Immigrant Trust Act (ITA)

- · Protects personal information by limiting the circumstances under which public agencies can collect information related to immigration status
- · Requires public schools, health care facilities, libraries, and shelters to adopt model policies to help people feel safer seeking the public services for which they are eligible
- · Prohibits state and local law enforcement from cooperating with federal immigration authorities when doing so is voluntary under federal law.

Following the call of our Convention, you are urged to contact legislators to advocate for its passage now. Resources, including key legislators to contact, phone numbers, and sample scripts for phone calls are on the Diocesan website (this resources was created for a "Phone Zap" on a day in November, but the information is still accurate to the best of our knowledge). The ITA has been assigned to Committees in both Houses, but hearings have yet to be held. The Senate President, Assembly Speaker, and the two Committee Chairs have crucial power in moving the ITA forward.

Lectionary & Liturgy

The Third Sunday of Advent again has as its central theme the ministry of John the Baptist. Jesus said of him, "Among those born of women there has risen no one greater than John the Baptist..." In today's Gospel, John, who has been imprisoned by Herod Antipas, is facing death and wishes to know before he dies that he was correct in identifying Jesus as the Messiah. Jesus' reply is to quote from the Messianic prophecy of Isaiah, demonstrating that he is indeed fulfilling the Messiah's ministry as Isaiah had foretold.

The Old Testament reading is the passage Jesus quotes in the Gospel reading. The sign of the Messiah is a new order of existence—God's Kingdom—in which health and salvation spring forth. The second reading is a call to patient waiting for the Lord to appear to inaugurate the kingdom of God.

The distinction between John and even the least in the kingdom—ourselves—who are even greater, is that our birth is more than natural—it is the new birth by water and the spirit in Holy Baptism, which has made us members of the Body of Christ. We are commissioned for ministry in Baptism; a ministry like that of Jesus. In Holy Eucharist, we affirm our commitment to that ministry to all people, which is the ongoing sign of Christ in the world.

- † Proclaiming Hymn Words: Philip Doddridge (1702-1751); his "hymns were written as summaries of his sermons and to help the congregation respond to the truths they were taught." –[Christian Classics Ethereal Library] He suffered from tuberculosis, and when a patron offered to finance a trip to Lisbon for his health, he said, "I can as well go to heaven from Lisbon as from Northampton." He died in Lisbon soon after his arrival. –[Bert Polman] Music: Thomas Haweis (1734-1820); a florid tune originally published in his Carmina Christo. Samuel Webbe, Jr., adapted & shortened it and named it after Rev. Leigh Richmond, a friend of Haweis's.
- † Gospel The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn't just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, "a famished land." It was, he said, like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there.
- † Prayers of the People Adapted from "Leading Intercessions: Prayers for Sundays, Holy Days and Festivals and for Special Services Years A, B & C" by Raymond Chapman. Prayers reflect the Bible readings of the day, creating a more integrated act of worship. The prayer leader represents before God all those who are present so that at the close of the prayer all can say with integrity the ancient word of assent: *Amen*. It is a Hebrew word that has come down untranslated through Greek and Latin into English. Virtually every other language Christians speak has similarly made room for this untranslated term. Often said to mean "so be it."
- † Maranatha An Aramaic phrase meaning "Our Lord, come!" or "Our Lord has come". It is a Christian expression of hope and anticipation for the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. The term appears in the New Testament as a closing to St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, and it is often used as a prayer and a rallying cry by early Christians.
- † Offertory Anthem Words: Anonymous, traditional Advent antiphon. Music: Sir James MacMillan (b. 1959); 2007, from the *Strathclyde Motets II*, dedicated to the Choir of St Columba's Church, Glasgow. –[© 2008 Boosey & Hawkes] The text (in English) is one of the "Great O" antiphons which are used on the seven days approaching Christmas. "Fervent longing for Christ is a prominent sentiment. 'Come' is repeated again and again as an ascending sequence, with crescendoing dynamics and increasing suspensions emphasizing the desperation of the people. The opening incorporates his characteristic ornamented vocal lines, later echoed in the final cadence, and their resolution from dissonance to consonance here may be an intentional musical representation of the conflicts resolved by Jesus' coming." –[Ghislaine Reece-Trapp © 2019]
- † Offertory Hymn Words: Charles Wesley (1707-1788). Music: melody from *Psalmodia Sacrta, oder Andchtige und Schone Gesang*, 1715 and now attributed to Christian Friedrich Witt; adapt. and harm. William Henry Havergal (1793-1870).
- † First Communion Hymn Words: Charles Coffin (1676-1749); originally written in Latin, early translators thought the text medieval. Coffin was principal of the college at Beauvais, 1712 and rector of the University of Paris, 1718. His hymns are described as having less brilliancy, but more simplicity and unction. –[John Julian, *Dictionary of Hymnology* (1907)] Music: melody from *Musicalisches Hand-Buch*, 1690; harm. William Henry Monk (1823-1889).
- † Second Communion Hymn Words: Sir John Bowring (1792–1872) was a British political economist, traveler, writer, literary translator, polyglot and the fourth Governor of Hong Kong. Music: Joseph Parry (1841-1903); composed in 1876, this is his best known hymn tune, and named after the Welsh seaside resort where he was teaching
- † Communion Meditation Words & Music: Jacques Berthier, Taizé Community [©1986, 1991, Les Presses de Taizé, GIA Publications, Inc.]
- † Sending Hymn Words: Laurentius Laurenti (1660-1722), a well-known writer of German hymns in the Pietist tradition, which are founded on the Gospels for Sundays and Festivals, and they draw out the bearing on the Christian life of the leading thoughts therein contained. They are of noble simplicity and are Scriptural, fervent, and often of genuine poetical worth. They were published in *Evangelia Melodica* (1700). Music: A Welsh hymn melody, its original key is g minor.
- † Book of Common Prayer "The United States BCP is not and never has been under copyright. So all are basically free to copy at will and it is absolutely completely permissible to post the book on Wikisource and other sites. Since there is no copyright, content control is done through the certificate at the beginning of the book."

Introduction to the Advent Liturgy at Trinity

Every liturgical year begins with the season of Advent. The word "advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, which literally means "coming." Bernard of Clairvaux summarized the theology of Advent with reference to the three comings of Christ – past, present and future: "In the first, Christ was our redemption; in the last he will appear as our life; in this middle coming, he is our rest and our consolation." Traditionally the color for Advent has been purple. This has led many congregations to think of Advent as a mini-Lent replete with penitence and abstinence thus obscuring the central themes of the hope and expectation in Advent. In recent times there has been a growing use of blue – the color that represents Mary, the mother of our Lord – in Advent. At the heart of Advent is the theme of hope and expectation in the midst of waiting.

Therefore, the Season of Advent invites us to craft our Liturgy in ways that reflect and elevate the themes of alert, expectant preparation. For this reason, this service includes a ritual for lighting the candles of the Advent Wreath and Advent-styled Prayers of the People. The successive lighting of the candles of the Advent wreath will take a central role in our liturgy. Our Advent wreath is made up of blue candles (the liturgical color for Advent) in a circle of evergreens. The circle has no beginning or end, reminding us of God's unending love for us. The evergreens are a sign of life in an otherwise lifeless winter. The focus of the candle lighting centers on the increasing light of God in the world. As has become our custom, the sanctuary is adorned with two evergreen trees. While these trees foreshadow Christmas celebrations, their primary symbolism is that of hope and life in the midst of a winter landscape. The "call and response" for the Prayers of the People will include the word *Maranatha*, an Aramaic word that means "the Lord is coming" or "come, O Lord." It was the common greeting among our brothers and sisters in the early church who were eagerly expecting the second coming of Christ.

Advent; the prophets' season

With the ubiquitous displays of Santa themed decor, and the relentless playlist of carols, you'd be forgiven for assuming that we're already in the season of Christmas. But actually, and quite wonderfully, we are in the midst of the season of Advent. Advent is a season of expectant hope and prophetic vigilance. The collect appointed for this Sunday reminds us to heed the warnings of the prophets whom God has sent. The Biblical prophets are always alert to what is leading their societies to health, and what aspects of their culture foreshadow brokenness.

I'm convinced that one of the most critical prophetic warnings needed in our time is the sinister direction in which technology is taking humanity. My own capitulation with technology – I'm writing this on a MacBook with an Apple Watch strapped to my wrist – leaves me in need of repentance. I'm old enough to remember when we were promised that email would save us hours of time: no more faxing, or opening and replying to letters. Now we spend, by some estimates, thirty days a year on email alone, and it is increasingly impossible to be out of touch with anyone, anywhere.

This is the devil's bargain of the technological society, and we have been falling for it for a long time: embrace the new, lose the old, and find yourself more deeply entwined in a technological web from which you cannot extricate yourself even if you want to. We only have to look at what screens are doing to our children for even the most oblivious parent to feel a shiver of unease. A compelling contemporary prophetic voice on this subject is Paul Kingsnorth, whose recent book *Against the Machine: On the Unmaking of Humanity* is a most worthwhile read in this season of Advent.
