




#### **Eucharistic Prayer for Pascha**

**Celebrating Sunday** 



It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth; but chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



Praise and thanksgiving be to you, Lord of all, for by the Cross we gain eternal life and death is swallowed up in victory. In the first light of Easter, glory broke from the tomb and changed the women's sorrow into joy. From the garden the mystery dawned that he whom they had loved and lost is with us now in every place for ever.

The Risen Lord was recognized in the breaking of the bread, the fearful disciples received a blessing of peace, and the weary fishermen found a ready welcome on the lakeshore. To them all Christ renewed the pledge of his presence and the promise of new birth in the Spirit.

Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release when slaves walked free, at supper with his disciples, Jesus took bread and offered you thanks. He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you."

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying: "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this to remember me."

And so, remembering all that was done for us: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, longing for Christ's coming in glory, and presenting to you these gifts your earth has formed and human hands have made, we acclaim you, O Christ:

Dying, you destroyed our death. Rising, you restored our life. Christ Jesus, come in glory! Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be to us the Body and the Blood of your Christ. Grant that we, burning with your Spirit's power, may be a people of hope, justice and love. Giver of Life, draw us together in the Body of Christ, and in the fullness of time gather us with all your people into the joy of our true eternal home.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever.





# "Hymn Sing" ~ from the Music Director

For quite a while I wanted to host a hymn festival. I have enjoyed attending hymn festivals and hymn sings over the years and have experienced the joy in singing our favorite hymns together. Our hymnal is full of beautiful poetic texts and tunes in praise of and in prayer to God, and our Episcopal tradition prides itself on its rich tradition and treasury of hymnody. The Hymnal 1982 contains works that span the past two millennia and range from introspective and devotional, to vigorous and regal. This is an opportunity to explore them together in an Easter Hymn Festival on May 19 at 4 PM.

This is a fun musical event for everyone to participate in singing some of our favorite hymns and enjoy making music together. This is a fundraiser which benefits both Trinity Episcopal Church and the James Lenney Memorial Choral Scholarship, which is awarded to a Cranford High School senior each year. A beloved resident of Cranford, Jim Lenney was Trinity's Choirmaster and Organist for 30 years, as well as the Choral Director at Cranford High School. There are two ways to participate in the hymn sing and donate:

- Beforehand, an entire hymn can be sponsored for the Easter Hymn Festival. Any hymn from the Hymnal 1982 can be requested at the cost of its hymn number. For example, hymn #460 (*Hyfrydol*) can be sponsored for \$460 and all verses will be sung, with a short improvisation at the introduction or conclusion. (Please choose only hymns from #174 onward, as this is an Easter Hymn Festival. It is far too early for Christmas Carols.) It is simple to sponsor an entire hymn, whether as an individual, a family, or a group of parishioners joining together. Please email the church office at *trinitycranford@gmail.com*. These sponsored selections will be due by Sunday, May 5.
- Admission to the Easter Hymn Festival is a suggested donation of \$15 and tickets will go on sale beginning Sunday, April 21. Each ticket will include a slip to request a hymn from the Hymnal 1982. These hymns will be pulled at random during the hymn festival. Whatever hymn is listed on the slip that is drawn will be sung. However, only the first and last verses of these hymns will be sung, so that we can get to as many of the hymns as time will allow.

A light reception will follow the hymn festival. This is going to be an enjoyable event for those who enjoy hymn singing, so invite your friends to join us. Again, to sponsor an entire hymn, please email the parish office. Contact me with questions or to assist with the hymn festival. I hope you will join the whole parish on May 19 at 4 PM, as we raise our voices together in song.

# Four Candidates Named for Presiding Bishop

*[ENS Episcopal News Service]* The Episcopal Church has announced four nominees to succeed Michael B. Curry as presiding bishop: The Bishops of Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Northwestern Pennsylvania, and Atlanta. The new primate will be chosen by fellow bishops at this summer's General Convention. The nominees are:

**Scott Barker**, 60, has led the Omaha-based Diocese of Nebraska since 2011. The diocese's 53 worshiping communities span the full state, where Barker was born and raised. A graduate of Berkeley Divinity School at Yale, Barker was ordained to the priesthood in 1992 and served for 10 years in Omaha and 10 more years in the Diocese of New York before returning to Nebraska as bishop.

**Daniel G.P. Gutiérrez**, 59, has led the Philadelphia-based Diocese of Pennsylvania since 2016. It is one of six dioceses in the state. A native of New Mexico, Gutiérrez earned a diocesan certificate in Anglican studies through Trinity School for Ministry and has a master's degree in theological studies from St. Norbert College. He was ordained to the priesthood in 2008 in Albuquerque-based Diocese of the Rio Grande and served as canon to the ordinary, chief operating officer. and chief of staff before elected Bishop of Pennsylvania.

**Sean Rowe**, 49, has led the Erie-based Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania since 2007, and he also serves as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Western New York through a partnership the dioceses established in 2019. He previously served as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Bethlehem from 2014 to 2018. Originally from western Pennsylvania, Rowe is a Virginia Theological Seminary graduate and was ordained to the priesthood in 2000 in Northwestern Pennsylvania, where he served in congregational ministry until his election as bishop. He serves as parliamentarian of the House of Bishops and Executive Council.

**Robert Wright**, 60, has led the Diocese of Atlanta since 2012. The diocese, based in Georgia's capital city, has 120 worshiping communities across the northern half of the state. A Navy veteran and graduate of Virginia Theological Seminary, Wright was ordained to the priesthood in 1999 in the Diocese of New York. At the time of his election as bishop, he had served the previous 10 years as rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Atlanta. Since 2020, he also has hosted a podcast on faith and life called For People.

The announcement immediately sparked social media chatter complaining that there were no female or LGBT candidates. Other posters pointed out that the 20-person nominating committee included three female bishops, and Curry's predecessor, Katharine Jefferts Schori, in 2006 became the first woman elected to lead a province of the Anglican Communion. The 2015 General Convention also considered a four-person, all-male slate. The bishops overwhelmingly chose Curry, making him the first Black presiding bishop and the first to be elected on a single ballot.

The 28<sup>th</sup> presiding bishop will be elected this summer at General Convention in Louisville, Kentucky. The House of Bishops will vote in executive session on Wednesday, June 26, immediately after a morning Eucharist. Later in the day, the House of Deputies will vote on whether to confirm the election. The canons are silent on what would happen if the deputies were to exercise their veto. In 2015, the deputies confirmed Curry's election by vote of 800 to 12. The new presiding bishop's nine-year term begins November 1.

The April 2 announcement initiates a petition process on April 3-15. The presiding bishop campaign, to the extent there is one, will bear no resemblance to the bitter presidential contest that continues to unfold. The nominees will not give news interviews, and even in private it would be considered extremely bad form for one nominee to criticize another. Each nominee recorded a brief video, available at generalconvention.org, "discussing a biblical image or metaphor that resonates with this moment in the life of the church and the role of the presiding bishop."

All of the nominees are comfortably young enough to serve a nine-year term before reaching the church's mandatory retirement age of 72. Rowe is a decade younger than the other candidates, yet also has the longest tenure as a bishop. Barker has the longest tenure as a priest. The nominating committee was co-chaired by Bishop of Alaska Mark Lattime and Steve Nishibayashi, a longtime lay leader in the Diocese of Los Angeles and former member of the Executive Council.

# Lectionary & Liturgy

On this Third Sunday of Easter, the Gospel reading directs our attention to the Eucharist as our ongoing experience of the resurrection. On the first Easter afternoon Jesus met two of his followers, and as they walked to the village of Emmaus he explained the scriptures concerning his death and resurrection to them. At table with them he said the blessing and broke the bread and they recognized him.

Today's Gospel reading carries that story to its conclusion. Those two disciples are in the midst of telling the others that Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread when he appears in their midst. He again explains the scriptures and shares food with them. Thus from the very beginning of the Church's life in the risen Lord, the meal has been the most common way Jesus' resurrection is revealed to his people.

Our reading from Acts today is an account of the manifestation of Christ's presence in and through his followers. Peter and John heal a cripple in the name of Jesus and then Peter proclaims the Gospel of the dying and rising of Jesus. The second reading this Sunday speaks of the forgiveness of sins we have as a result of our life in Christ. We are a people who through Baptism and Eucharist live in Christ's dying and rising. We meet him again and again in the Breaking of the Bread and acclaim him. "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us. Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!"

- † Cover art "We Are One in Jesus the Lord" (2009) by Soichi Watanabe (b. 1949). He was drawn to God as an undergraduate student during a home Bible study; "the richness of the biblical world overwhelmed me and at the same time tortured me. I really heard a voice telling me to accept the salvation of Jesus on the cross and to follow him. My works are my own humble responses to God's calling in my life. The images are often given to me through the words of God at worship services on Sundays and during my daily devotion. I have the earnest hope that I will go on painting to praise the Lord."
- † Gathering Hymn Words: Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895). Music: Joachim Neander (1650-1680); German student life in the 17<sup>th</sup> century was anything but refined, and he was fond of questionable pleasures. In 1670, Neander and 2 comrades went to service one Sunday to criticize and find matters of amusement; but earnest words proved the turning-point of his spiritual life. "The glow and sweetness of his better hymns, their firm faith, originality, Scripturalness, variety and mastery of rhythmical forms, and genuine lyric character fully entitled them to the high place they hold." –[John Julian, *Dictionary of Hymnology* 1907]
- Service Music William Mathias (1934-1992) –[©1976 Oxford University Press]. "Music was an ever-present force for my father. I was aware from a very early age that the creative process was something always present for him even when he was doing something else and that it was a force which he could turn in any desired direction or channel at a given time. Hence his ability to compose a wide variety of orchestral, choral, instrumental or chamber music, as well as music for the church and for young people." –[daughter Rhiannon Mathias]
- † Common Worship A family of volumes which, together with the BCP, make up the official liturgical resource of the Church of England. It represents the most recent stage of development of the Liturgical Movement within the Church.
- Collect of the Day This is a revised version of the collect for the Monday in Easter Week of the 1928 Book, composed by the Rev. Dr. John W. Suter, Sr. It is associated with the story of our Lord's appearance to the disciples at Emmaus after the resurrection, when He made Himself known "in the breaking of bread" [Luke 24:35]. The original form of the result clause read: "That we may behold thee in all thy works." –[*Notes on the American Prayer Book* by Marion Hatchett]
- Plainsong Psalter Plainsong dates from the earliest centuries of Christianity. It has one melody traditionally sung without musical accompaniment and based on the psalms. Editor James Litton is widely recognized as one of the leading American choral conductors, a member of the Standing Commission on Church Music who participated in the preparation and publication of the Hymnal 1982, directed the American Boychoir (1985-2001), and a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music (one of 7 Americans to receive this honor).
- **Proclaiming Chant** Contributors: Jacques Berthier, Taizé Community. Tune: ©1984, Les Presses de Taizé, GIA Publications.
- f Gospel The Christian gospel, for Augustine, wasn't just the answer to an intellectual question (though it was that); it was more like a shelter in a storm, a port for a wayward soul, nourishment for a prodigal who was hungering, whose own heart had become, he said, "a famished land." Like someone had finally shown him his home country, even though he had never been there before.

- \* Nicene Creed This version is designed to contain "all the expansive language texts currently authorized." It is almost identical to the version in the BCP. The omission of the words 'and the Son' (*filioque*) restores the text of the Creed to the original wording agreed upon at the Fourth Ecumenical Council of Constantinople (381 CE). The addition of that phrase was a later development implemented only in the Western Church and without the approval of a General Council.
- **† Prayers of the People –** Note that it is not the leader of those prayers who does the praying. That person whether ordained or not simply announces the theme, and all of us, the baptized royal priesthood, pray in the power of the Spirit to the Father.
- † Offertory Anthem Words: Edmund Spenser (1552-1599), one of the greatest poets in the English language; like most Protestants near the time of the Reformation, Spenser saw a Catholic church full of corruption, and he determined that it was not only the wrong religion but the anti-religion. Music: English organist and composer Sir William H. Harris (1883-1973).
- † Offertory Hymn Words: Charles Wesley (1707-1788), considered to be the most popular of all Ascension texts in Englishlanguage worship; however, Thomas Cotterill significantly changed the text in his *Selection of Psalms and Hymns* of 1820 and the "alleluias" were added over a century later. Music: often attributed to the blind singer Robert Williams (1781-1821), a basket weaver with great innate musical ability; he could write out a tune after hearing it just once. Scholars have some doubts about his authorship; the tune name comes from a village on the island of Anglesey.
- First Communion Hymn Words: Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885), Bishop of Lincoln; first published in his Holy Year, etc, 1862. "The first duty of a hymn-writer is to teach sound doctrine, and thus to save souls. Its use in all English-speaking countries is most extensive, and it ranks with the best of the author's hymns." –[John Julian, Dictionary of Hymnology, 1907] Music: Arthur Seymour Sullivan (1842-1900), best known for writing the music for lyrics by William S. Gilbert, which produced popular operettas. Sullivan steadfastly refused to grant permission to those who wished to make hymn tunes from the popular melodies in his operettas.
- Second Communion Hymn Words: Cyril A. Alington (1872-1955) [©1958, 1986, Hope Publishing; St.5 ©1971 Walton Music]. Written while Headmaster of Eton College expressly for this tune in 1931. "The stanzas vibrate with excitement, they utter the encouragement of victory, and they stir the heart to praise and thanksgiving." –[Stanley L. Osborne] Educated at Trinity College, Oxford, England, he was ordained in the Church of England in 1901. He was dean of Durham from 1933-1951 as well as chaplain to the king of England. Music: Melchior Vulpius (1570-1615) Because the text dates from the early 16<sup>th</sup> century, some scholars think the tune may have older roots. Born into a poor family he had limited educational opportunities and did not attend university. A distinguished composer, he wrote a *St. Matthew Passion* (1613), nearly 200 motets in German and Latin, and over 400 hymn tunes, many of which became popular in Lutheran churches. –[*Psalter Hymnal Handbook*, 1988]
- Sending Hymn Words: Brian A. Wren (b. 1936) [©1975 Hope Publishing Co.] "It was written for Easter Sunday, two weeks after the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. I could not let Easter go by without speaking of this tragic event which was on all our minds. I tried to express an Easter hope out of that terrible event, in words which could be more widely applied, and wrote 'Christ is alive!' because our available hymns spoke of Easter as a glorious event long ago, far away, and high above. The hymn tries to see God's love winning over tragedy and suffering in the world. There is tension and tragedy in these words, not just Easter rejoicing." A joyful celebration of Christ's resurrection and of his personal rule in a human world in which pain, war, and injustice abound. Christ's transcendent and immanent reign is empowered by the Holy Spirit and will ultimately bring about a new creation. –[*Psalter Hymnal Handbook*, 1988] Music: melody from *Psalmodia Evangelica, Part II*, 1789; harmony Lowell Mason (1792-1872).
- Postlude David Lasky (b. 1957) is Organist and Director of Music at Saint Cecilia Catholic Church in Leominster, Massachusetts since 1981, and resides in Hartland, Vermont with his wife and three cats. Published in 2011 by MorningStar Music.

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
